Kindergarten & Grade 1: Cowboys, Indians, & Art Classroom Activities

Subjects: Math and Fine Arts, Visual Arts

Standard: MGSEK.G.6: Compose simple shapes to form larger shapes.

VAKPR.1: Creates artworks based on personal experience and selected themes.

b. Creates artworks emphasizing one or more elements of art (e.g., color, line, shape, form, texture).

Materials:

- Construction paper
- Scraps of wrapping paper, or other colorful paper
- Scissors
- glue

Activity: A Shape Collage

- Students choose two scraps of wrapping paper that are about the same size.
- Students hold the two pieces together as they cut out a circle, triangle, or square.
- Holding the two identical shapes together, the students fold the shape in half.
- Cut out the center of the shape.
- Additional cuts are made to the remaining shape
- Students glue the pieces on the construction paper square using parts of one colored shape to complete the other colored shape.

Standard: MGSE1.G.2 Compose two-dimensional shapes (rectangles, squares, trapezoids, triangles, half-circles and quarter-circles) to create a composite shape.

Activity: Shapes in Art

Materials: Construction paper – black 6" X 12"; 4" X 6" – yellow, green, red, blue, etc.; scissors, glue

- > Students cut shapes from construction paper
- > Rectangle, squares, trapezoids, triangles, half-circles, quarter-circles
- > Students layer the cutouts on the black paper to form a picture.
- > Students use colored paper scraps to add details to the cutouts.
- ➢ Glue in place.

Subject: Science

Standard: SKP1. Students will describe objects in terms of the materials they are made of and their physical properties.

b. Use senses to classify common materials, such as buttons or swatches of cloth, according to their physical attributes (color, size, shape, weight, texture, buoyancy, flexibility).

Materials: familiar objects from the classroom and/or objects connected with Cowboys, Indians, and Art...Examples:

- Crayons, markers, paint brushes, glue sticks
- Items made of leather, cowbell, cowboy/girl boots, beef jerky
- Feathers, moccasins, beads

Activity: Using Your Senses

Students participate in identification activities based on the five senses; sight, touch, taste, smell and sound

Standard: S1CS5: Students will communicate scientific ideas and activities clearly.

b. Draw pictures (grade level appropriate) that correctly portray features of the thing being described.

Materials: pencils, colored pencils and paper

Activity: Drawing

Students draw pictures of the objects being described, and then draw the object again once they actually see it.
